

A Review of Swarna Jayanti Shahari Rozgar Yojana

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Abstract

Swarna Jayanti Shahari Rozgar Yojana (SJSRY) is a centrally sponsored scheme launched in December 1997 aimed at providing gainful employment opportunities and empowering the urban poor by enhancing their skills and capacities.
